PUPIL PREMIUM REPORT 2016/17

The following document is to help you to understand what Pupil Premium is, and to outline how Nonington Primary school spends these additional funds.

What is pupil premium?

Introduced in 2011, the pupil premium is a sum of money given to schools to improve the attainment of disadvantaged children.

This is based on research showing that children from low income families perform less well at school than their peers. Often, children who are entitled to pupil premium face challenges such as poor language and communication skills, less family support, lack of confidence and issues with attendance and punctuality. The pupil premium is intended to directly benefit the children who are eligible, helping to narrow the gap between them and their classmates.

Which children are eligible?

Schools are given a pupil premium for:

•Children who have qualified for free school meals at any point in the past six years. The school receives £1300 for each of these children.

•Children who have been looked after under local authority care for more than one day. These children are awarded a premium of £1900.

How can to claim your child's pupil premium.

From September 2014, all children in Reception and Years 1 and 2 will qualify for free school meals, regardless of their family income, but only the children who would have qualified for free meals under the above income-based criteria will receive the pupil premium.

If your child qualifies for free school meals, it's important that you make us aware – even if they take a packed lunch – as this enables them to claim pupil premium. Your child may be eligible for free school meals – and accordingly pupil premium – if you receive any of the following benefits:

- Income support
- •Income-based jobseekers' allowance
- •Income-related employment and support allowance
- •Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- •The guaranteed element of state pension credit

•Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less

•Universal credit

We will be able to tell you what you need to do to register your child as eligible.

How is Pupil Premium spent?

Schools can choose how to spend their pupil premium money, as they are best placed to identify what would be of most benefit to the children who are eligible. It is up to the Head Teacher to ultimately decide how this is spent.

The grant is paid based upon the financial year and the amounts below are described as such. The interventions and strategies on which the school spends the PPG are described in terms of the school year.

Barriers to learning

Children from disadvantaged backgrounds can exhibit a number of barriers to learning. At Nonington Primary School we have studied the barriers that exist for our children especially those in receipt of PPG. We have established these through observations and professional judgement made by our teaching staff. We have used the Boxall profiling system to highlight areas in which we need to focus to improve attainment and positive learning behaviours. Below is a summary of the barriers to learning exhibited by the children who qualify for PPG.

Pupil Voice

In addition to academic progress and achievement, a particular focus at Nonington is the feeling of wellbeing that the various programmes we run can influence. Pupil voice is an essential part of measuring the impact of an intervention, programme or workshop. This can reveal how positively expenditure has impacted on the pupils, this is not apparent when looking at data focussed on progress or attainment; however it is just as important.
